THE PVSC VARIETY SHOW 2020 - Wednesdays at 4:00

- July 8 Sol Goldman, "Ramos vs. Louisiana: A Peek Behind the Curtain." Sol Goldman is a retired lawyer and adjunct professor of Political Science at the University of Maine. In April, the Supreme Court decided that the constitution requires a unanimous verdict to convict a defendant of a serious criminal offense. The decision saw an unusual mashup of liberals and conservatives on the Court. Behind their decisions were battles about precedent, race, abortion and more.
- July 15 Bob Tredwell, "Waves and Beaches." Bob Tredwell teaches PVSC course on any and all practical topics. This is about waves: their size and shape, how they mold beaches, how the wind raises the waves, and about the very long, low, wave that is the tide. In passing, a quick look at river waves and tidal bores. Think of it as a guidebook for a walk on the shore—any shore.
- July 22 Liam Riordan, "Brainstorming the Bicentennial: Past and Present Perspectives on Maine at 200." Liam Riordan is a Professor of History at the University of Maine. This illustrated presentation and discussion explores the long statehood process in Maine that culminated in 1820 with formal separation from Massachusetts. That struggle engaged a range of challenging public issues that are still recognizable today.
- July 29 Rabbi Darah Lerner, "The Bible Doesn't Say That." Darah Lerner is rabbi of Congregation Beth El in Bangor. We will look at a few misunderstandings and mistranslations to help us better embrace this most meaning filled and challenging book.
- August 5 Steve Norton, "The Iceman Cometh: Maine Lakes." Steve Norton is professor emeritus of Earth and Climate Sciences at the University of Maine. What is so special about the freezing point of water: 32° F or 0° C? We will explore water, ice, weather, and climate to explain some of Maine lake behavior.
- August 12 Bari Newport, "Going National: How America's Regional Theatre Movement Changed the Game." Bari Newport is the Producing Artistic Director of Penobscot Theatre Company. The American theatre as we know it didn't just evolve organically, inevitably; it was conjured by visionaries who dreamt of a national theatre outside New York, then built it.
- August 19 Nancy Diamond and David Payne, "The African-American Presence in Maine." David Payne is a family genealogist. Nancy Diamond is a Bangor resident. An overview of the surprising history of Black migration to Maine from the Maritimes and Bangor's African-American community.
- August 26 and August 27 Erica Nadelhaft, "German POW Camps in Maine during World War II." A special two-part program, Wednesday and Thursday at 4:00. Erica Nadelhaft is an educator at the Holocaust and Human Rights Center and a history professor at UMFK. The story of German prisoner of war camps from 1944 to 1946 that were located in Houlton, Spencer Lake, Seboomook, and Indian township. The presentation also covers the politics that led to the creation of the camps.

UMaine Food Innovation Program – Free Virtual Tour via Zoom

Rob Dumas, head of the University of Maine's Food Innovation Program will present a virtual tour via Zoom, of the Processing Equipment and Analytical Suite. Also part of the presentation are details on Combi oven technology, Lyophilisers (freeze-driers), Smokehouse, Cheese Vat and Press, DeSinewer, and Pasta Extruders.

The program will be interactive for approximately and hour, and then allow for questions. Rob will show some examples of products from the equipment via photos from previous operations.
