# Hybrid (In Person/Zoom):

Tuesday, June 6th 10:00-12:00 (In Person/Zoom) – Mike Timpson "Trekking the Great Himalaya Trail in Nepal" Zoom: No limt

In-Person Maximum: TBD UMA-Bangor Lewiston Hall-119

In March 2022, six "crazy" people set off to hike across Nepal on the highest elevation trail in the world, the Great Himalaya Trail (GHT). This presentation will provide some history and background about Nepal, and then illustrate the trip with a combination of maps, photos, video. Spoiler alert, none of us completed the entire trek, but it was still an amazing adventure.

#### **Presenter: Mike Timpson**

Mike is a retired earth scientist who fell in love with big mountains after reading Maurice Herzog's book "Annapurna" as a teenager. Mike is definitely an amateur photographer who enjoys capturing images from his travels, but also enjoys taking photos in his own back yard (literally).

Tuesday June 27th, 10:00-12:00 (In Person/Zoom) – Dr. John Kaiser "Diseases of the Lungs and Trachea" Zoom: No limit In-Person Maximum: TBD, UMA-Bangor Lewiston Hall-119

Pulmonary diseases such as asthma, emphysema, and lung cancer are very common and important to understand. Other diseases, such as pneumonia, become more frequent with Covid and newer treatments for cancer and autoimmune diseases. We will discuss these and other interesting pulmonary diseases.

#### Presenter: Dr. John Kaiser

Dr. Kaiser is a pathologist who attended Dartmouth Medical School and Harvard Medical School and did his pathology residency and melanoma fellowship at Massachusetts General Hospital. He practiced pathology at Dahl Chase Pathology Associates and Eastern Maine Medical Center from 1975-2007. Since 2018, Dr. Kaiser has presented well-received lectures for PVSC on cancer, cardiovascular diseases, infectious diseases, of the nervous system and gastrointestinal tract.

Are you confused by the terms on food packages, "use by, or sell by?" Are these expiration dates? Is the food safe to eat beyond the date? Are you throwing out food that may be ok? Let's look at the definition of these terms and the practical application.

Mary is a Dietitian with Hannaford. Mary works out of the Airport Mall and Broadway stores. Her role with Hannaford is to support shoppers, customers, and associates in finding foods and promoting education about foods that are in line with the person's health needs.

#### **Presenter: Danny Williams**

Danny is the Executive Director at the Collins Center for the Arts at UMaine. He received both his B.A. in Music and M.Ed. in Higher Education from the University of Maine and has spent his varied career at UMaine holding a number of positions. Danny has been a strong voice and advocate for the arts while serving as a member and chair of UMaine's Patrons of the Arts and as a long-standing member of the Maine Center/Collins Center for Arts Board. Among many other contributions to the arts community, in 2001 Danny founded the Maine Black Bear Men's Chorus where he is Music Director. He grew up in Bangor and currently lives in Orono with his wife Emily Cain.

#### **Presenter: Emily Cain**

Emily is a politician from Maine and Executive Director of <a href="EMILY's List">EMILY's List</a>. Emily, representing the Democratic Party, served in the Maine Senate from 2012 to 2014, representing the 30th district which includes part of Penobscot County. She was previously a member of the Maine House of Representatives from 2004 to 2012, where she served as Minority Leader from 2008 to 2010 and as House Chair of the Appropriations & Financial Affairs Committee from 2010 to 2012.

Friday, July 7, TBD (In Person) Citizenship and Naturalization Ceremony US District Court Bangor 202 Harlow St. Maximum: TBD

Citizenship is a unique bond that unites people around civic ideals and a belief in the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution.

Deciding to become a U.S. citizen is one of the most important decisions an immigrant can make. Depending on each situation, there may be different ways to obtain citizenship.

- **Naturalization** is the process by which U.S. citizenship is granted to a lawful permanent resident after meeting the requirements established by Congress in the <u>Immigration and Nationality Act (INA)</u>.
- **Acquisition** of citizenship is obtained through U.S. citizenship parents either at birth or after birth, but before the age of 18.

Patsy has taught everything from kindergarten to grade 6-you might say she's experienced everything from snowsuit zips to hormonal quips-and survived! Now retired, she has become an avid flower gardener, specializing in teddy bear sunflowers.

# Tuesday, August 8, 10:00-12:00 PM Lin Lufkin, Bob Ziegelaar Bangor, Maine: The Center of the World No Minimum or Maximum UMA-Bangor campus Building TBD

Bangor since the early 1800's has been the leading center of development in Maine, once rivaling Boston as the prime hub of activity in the northeast United States. Its location on a main river with access to transportation from the Atlantic Ocean to inland North America allowed ship's captains and hardy pioneers to today's entrepreneurs and builders to produce for tomorrow. We will trace its challenges of travel via road, rail, water, and air to move goods to and from Maine to the world.

#### Linwood (Lin) Lufkin

Lin is a civil engineer graduate from the University of Maine and Texas A&M. He has worked in the Army Corp of Engineers, at CIANBRO Corporation, and Nickerson and O'Day on various commercial construction projects from roads and bridges to commercial buildings.

#### **Bob Ziegelaar**

Bob graduated from Bates College in Maine and from Nyenrode Business University, the Netherlands. The former Director of Bangor International Airport, he was instrumental in the conversion of the former military field to a full-fledged and well-known commercial international airport. After leaving the airport in 2001, Bob held leadership positions in aviation, consulting, and investment companies.

Tuesday, August 29th, 10:00-12:00 (In-Person) – Dick Cattelle The Early Space Program – My Personal Experience Challenger Learning, Center 30Venture Way, Bangor Maximum: 28

Where were you and what were you doing during the 1960s and the early 1970s? As crazy as the world seems today the 60s and 70s certainly had their share of wild and wonderful (and unfortunately some terrible) events. Dick had the good fortune to have been involved in the Space Program and specifically the Manned Space Program for most of that period. In this presentation, Dick will share some of his trip through that era. Following that, you will have the opportunity to participate in a mini mission utilizing the facilities at the Challenger Learning Center so you can experience a part of what the CLC has given to over 100,000 students over the last 20 years of operation.

#### Richard (Dick) Cattelle

A native of New Jersey, Dick is a graduate of the University of Maine, Orono. He had a 15-year Aerospace career working on NASA's Saturn Apollo Program. He was a flight controller in Mission Control for the Lunar Landing, Skylab and Apollo/Soyuz missions. Dick and his wife, Marit, are actively involved in the Bangor community since 1976. Now "somewhat: retired," Dick was part of the core group that brought the Challenger Learning Center to Bangor and is still involved in its operation.

## Field Trips:

Tuesday, June 20th, 10:00-12:00 (Field Trip) – Dick Andren "A Walk in the Woods"
Hirundo Wildlife Refuge 1107 West Old Town Road Alton, ME
Minimum 5, Maximum 15 (\$10 fee to be paid in cash on June 20<sup>th</sup>)

The class will meet at the Pond Trail-enter though Gate 1, drive on the dirt about 0.5 mile and park there. We will walk along the pond trail. The trail is level and hardpacked and ADA compliant. The trail passes through several interesting habitats. Participants will cross plant and animal adaptations necessary to thrive under different conditions. There are benches along the trail in case anyone needs a chance to sit. Bring a bag lunch, if you wish, to eat with others in the Nature Center after the walk.

#### **Presenter: Dick Andren**

Dick is a retired biology professor with an abiding interest in the natural world and Maine in particular. He has been a Board member of Hirundo Wildlife Refuge for nearly 15 years.

## Tuesday, July 25th 10:00-12:00 (Field Trip) – Bucky Owen Orono Land Trust and Land Trusts of Maine Maximum 20

This field trip will involve discussion on the history and role of Land Trusts in Maine, with emphasis on the ecological and recreational roles of these Trusts. The class will then explore the Orono Land Trust with about two miles of easy walking.

#### **Bucky Owen**

Bucky is a retired wildlife ecologist. He taught at the University of Maine for more than 30 years and was Commissioner of the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife. Bucky has worked with the Orono Land Trust for over 35 years.

# Tuesday, August 15, 10:00-12:00 Trisha Martin A Tour of Maple Crest Farm- A Nonprofit farm in Hermon, Maine Maximum: 30

Maple Crest Farm is a nonprofit and currently home to a combination of rescue and domestic animals including: Alpaca, Sheep, Mini Donkeys, Horses, Goats, Peacocks, Swans, Bees, and a variety of Pheasants, Chickens, Geese, Ducks, and Guinea Hens, and of course the family's two Bernedoodles and two cats. We would enjoy sharing them with you! Trish will talk about how the farm became a nonprofit, the various animals on the farm, beekeeping, info about the various types of fruit-bearing and other trees, and how she incorporated her knowledge as teacher into giving people tours of the farm.
